





This grammar activity is based on an article from an issue of The Primary Planet about the destruction of a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Read through the article and see if you can spot the 10 spelling mistakes, the 5 missing capital letters and the 5 missing full stops.

UNESCO Site Destroyed

Palmyra is about 250 kilometres northeast of the Syrian capital, damascus. It was given the name Palmyra, meaning "city of palm trees," by the Romans, who attacked and captured it in AD 130. Travelers have been astounded that such an important site should be located in the middle of the Syrian Dessert, half-way between the Mediterranean coast and the River euphrates. The ancient city lies on an oasis of date palms and gardens It is often refered to as the "Venice of the Sands" and like the Italian city, it was a centre for trade, with the desert as its sea and camels as its ships.

In 1980, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) designated the anceint ruins as a World Heritage site. There were over 1,000 stone colums and other ruins including a theatre, a roman aqueduct, a senate house, some villas and a number of tombs There were also examples of art and architecture from the 1st and 2nd Centuries, which combined Greco-Roman techniques with local traditions and Persian influences. The Temple of Bel which was the great sanctuary of the Palmyrene gods – one of the most important religious buildings of the 1st Century AD in the East- was a major attraction to the 150,000 tourists who visited the site every year, before the present Syrian conflict began in 2011 IS (Islamic State) militants captured the site from goverment forces in May 2015 There were reports of a massive explosion in the area on August 30th and satelight images later showed that the Temple of Bel, as well as a lion of columns beside it, had been destroyed.

Maamoun Abdul Karim, the head of the Syrian Department of Antiquities and Museums, said its destruction was a "catastrophy". "I feel very sad and i am very pessimistic... for the future of Palmyra," he told BBC Radio 5 Live.


Authorities removed hundereds of statues and priceless objects before IS captured palmyra, as the militants have a record of destroying artefacts However, the loss of such an important historical building is a disaster not only for Syria, but for the whole world.
